While very helpful in determining the reuse of early components at Faneuil Hall, this paint study literally has only "scratched the surface" of the fascinating story of the decorative appearance of the building in 1899 and earlier. The subject should receive much closer scrutiny at a future date, in order to establish firmly the nature of coexisting color schemes — both interior and exterior — at Faneuil Hall over the years.
